LAKESIDE CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP Leadership Council Report for April 13, 2015

The meeting was chaired by Moderator, Dan Olson. The following items were on the agenda:

- (1) A proposed draft of the By-Laws to clarify the duties of the Nominating Committee;
- (2) A request from guests, Tom Gardner and Burt Burchette, members of the Nominating Committee that a survey be made of comparable-size churches in the area to see how they set up their administrative and committee structures to see if some efficiencies could be achieved in our structure. It was agreed that Pastor Chuck would conduct such a survey and report back to the Council.
- (3) The new Bible stand made by Clyde Hance was pointed out. Other people who made special contributions in the month of March were Linda Harting for the Pot Luck Lunch on March 29; Mary Ann Childs for the Easter Lilies; and Rodger Elliott and Clyde Hance for the Easter Sunrise Service.
- (4) There was discussion about the Benevolence Policy, with some concerns expressed about possible abuses of it, but after discussion, it was decided that the policy will stay as it is.

- (5) Under Pastoral Relations, Ginger reported that Sue Broker and Karen Adams continue to be satisfied with the arrangements for them to share the piano-playing duties. For funerals and specials occasions, families will be asked to make an honorarium to the piano player.
- (6) Under Outreach and Ministries, Pastor Chuck reported that the Director of Hill Country Ministries had resigned effective May 1, that there is an interim director in place and a search committee at work. He reminded members of the special session at the library on April 16, featuring information about Medicaid and Medicare.
- (7) A new church business card was approved, using the word "guests" rather than "visitors".
- (8) Future business will include the start of the 2016 budget planning.
- (9) An announcement that there will be an "In God We Trust" Parade on Thursday, May 7, at 7:00 p.m.; marching down Dawn Drive with a police escort and arriving at the gazebo in front of City Hall. It's in honor of the National Day of Prayer and the Jesus Walk.

After the opening prayer, the devotional was given by Dayle Aulds, featuring the "In God We Trust" theme on a penny. The minutes were read and approved, and the treasury stands at \$1,148.12.

Sharon Waters introduced the speaker, Nancy Coldicott, one of the best-known and highly respected members of the community, as she owns the physical therapy studio in Lago Vista. She is also the mother of triplet girls whom many Lago Vista women helped to take care of when they were born and after that. She advised the group she graduated from the University of Texas Health Center in San Antonio.

She advised that her theme was going to be a message that would actually help us make our lives better - so we would never have to come see her! She then listed in order the top ten injuries and conditions she sees in her practice. For each condition, she demonstrated exercises that could be done to prevent those injuries. They are:

#1 - back injuries; #2 - knee injuries; #3 - shoulders; #4 - feet; - #5 - neck pain; #6 - falls, in general; #7 - hips; #8 - ankles; #9 - thoracic spine; #10 - elbow & wrist.

At the end of her extremely informative and practical program, every member had plenty of knowledge as to how to prevent all of those types of injuries or conditions.

The next Bible study was announced by Lil Burch; members were asked to think about possible recipients for the Ways & Means fund distribution; there will be an upcoming estate sale for Sue Hance. Hostesses for the luncheon were Janette Howle & Bev Olson, using a pastel Spring theme.



Breast Cancer

Breast Cancer Today

Breast cancer today is not what it was 20 years ago. Survival rates are climbing, thanks to greater awareness, more early detection, and advances in treatment. For roughly 200,000 Americans who are diagnosed with breast cancer each year, there are plenty of reasons to be hopeful.

Breast Cancer Symptoms

There are often no symptoms of breast cancer, but sometimes women may discover a breast problem on their own. Signs and symptoms to be aware of may include:

- A painless lump in the breast
- Changes in breast size or shape
- Swelling in the armpit
- Nipple changes or discharge
- Breast pain can also be a symptom of cancer, but this is not common.

Signs of Inflammatory Breast Cancer

Inflammatory breast cancer is a rare, fast-growing type of cancer that often causes no distinct lump. Instead, breast skin may become thick, red, and may look pitted -- like an orange peel. The area may also feel warm or tender and have small bumps that look like a rash.

Breast Cancer and Mammograms

The earlier breast cancer is found, the easier it is to treat. And mammograms, X-rays of the breast, can detect tumors before they are large enough to feel. The American Cancer Society recommends yearly mammograms beginning at age 40 for women at average risk. The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force recommends a screening mammogram every two years from age 50 to 74. It also notes that before age 50, each woman should check with a doctor to find out what screening schedule is right for her, considering the potential benefits and harms.

Breast Ultrasound and MRI

Besides a mammogram, your doctor may order additional imaging with breast ultrasound. An ultrasound can help determine the presence of cysts, fluid-filled sacs that are not cancer. An MRI may be recommended along with a mammogram for routine screening in certain women who have a higher risk of breast cancer.

Breast Self-Exams

It was once widely recommended that women check their own breasts once a month. But studies suggest these breast self-exams play a very small role in finding cancer. The current thinking is that it's more important to know your breasts and be aware of any changes, rather than checking them on a regular schedule. If you want to do breast self-exams, be sure to go over the technique with your doctor.

What If You Find a Lump?

First, don't panic. Eighty percent of breast lumps are not cancerous. Lumps often turn out to be harmless cysts or tissue changes related to your menstrual cycle. But you should let your doctor know right away if you find anything unusual in your breast. If it is cancer, the earlier it's found the better. And if it's not, testing can give you peace of mind.

Breast Biopsy

The only sure way to determine whether a lump is cancer is to do a biopsy. This involves taking a tissue sample for further examination in the lab, sometimes through a small needle. Sometimes surgery is done to take part of or the entire lump for testing. The results will show whether the lump is cancer, and if so, what type. There are several forms of breast cancer, and treatments are carefully matched to the type of cancer.

Hormone-Sensitive Breast Cancer

Some types of breast cancer are fueled by the hormones estrogen or progesterone. A biopsy can reveal whether a tumor has receptors for estrogen (ER-positive) and/or progesterone (PR-positive). About two out of three breast cancers are hormone sensitive. There are several medications that keep the hormones from promoting further cancer growth. The image shows a molecular model of an estrogen receptor.

HER2-Positive Breast Cancer

In about 20% of patients, breast cancer cells have too many receptors for a protein called HER2. This type of cancer is known as HER2-positive, and it tends to spread faster than other forms of breast cancer. It's important to determine whether a tumor is HER2-positive, because there are special treatments for this form of cancer.

A HER2-positive breast cancer cell is illustrated here, with abnormal growth signals shown in green.

Breast Cancer Stages

Once breast cancer has been diagnosed, the next step is to determine how big the tumor is and how far the cancer has spread. This process is called staging. Doctors use Stages 0-4 to describe whether cancer is localized to the breast, has invaded nearby lymph nodes, or has spread to other organs, such as the lungs. Knowing the stage and type of breast cancer will help your health care team formulate a treatment strategy.

Breast Cancer Survival Rates

The odds of surviving breast cancer are strongly tied to how early it is found. According to the American Cancer Society, 88% of women with Stage 1 breast cancer live at least five years, compared with women who don't have cancer -- and many women in this group remain cancer-free for good. The more advanced the cancer, the lower this figure becomes. By Stage 4, the five-year relative survival rate declines to 15%. But these rates can improve as more effective treatments are found.

Easter Sunrise Service

We had 33 people at Easter Sunrise Service. It was cloudy, chilly and windy but the rain came after we had gone home. We had a young man from Austin that come to our service. He looked on the Internet and many churches had Easter Sunrise services—indoors. Our church service was the only one he found with an outdoor service and he checked our Website for more information. We also had several nonchurch members from the community that attended. Some have been coming every year. Pastor Chuck delivered a very good sermon.





